Forest Gate Academy Early Years department provides children with an outstanding level of care combined with a warm, secure and stimulating environment. We pride ourselves on

delivering a fun, creative and balanced curriculum for all our pupils, both in Nursery and Reception, that develops their knowledge, skills and understanding and prepares them for their educational journey.

Our Nursery is staffed with a Nursery Teacher and a Level 3 Teaching Assistant. Our Reception class also has a Teacher and a Level 3 Teaching Assistant. All of our Early Years staff are fully trained in paediatric first aid. Our nursery can accommodate a maximum of 26 children between the ages of 3 and 4 years. Our numbers are small so that all abildren receive lets of individual attention from staff who are experi children receive lots of individual attention from staff who are experienced, dedicated and professional.

Doors open at 8.35am and we invite parents/carers to 'stay and play' from 8.35am – 8.45am each day.

We work closely with parents at all times. From the very start you will find the Early Years community a warm and supportive environment. We work to ensure that you have peace of mind that your child is happy, safe and learning. As well as daily dialogue, we invite parents to a Parents' Evening/Meetings where you are able to view your child's learning at regular intervals throughout the year.

NURSERY-What we have to offer..

At Forest Gate Academy Nursery we offer part time and full time places. Doors open at 8.35am.

Morning sessions run from 8.45am—11.45am and afternoons from 12:15pm—3:15pm. Full time places are also available 8.45am— 3:15pm including lunch.



All children receive a piece of fruit and milk each day.

All children are entitled to 15 hours of free Nursery education per week (Core Universal Offer). Full-time places are available for children who qualify for 30 hour funding through Trafford. For those not eligible for the additional free15 hours, the cost of any additional provision will be chargeable at £5.00 per hour. This equates to £75.00 per week which must be paid in advance. Lunch can also be provided at a fixed cost of £2.25 per day and will include a hot meal, dessert and a drink. However you are welcome to send your child in with a packed lunch if you prefer.

Eligibility for 30 hours free childcare from Trafford Council:

3 and 4 year old children are eligible for 30 hours free childcare where their household meets the following eligibil-

- both parents are working or one parent is working in lone parent families. This is defined as earning the equivalent of 16 hours per week on national minimum wage/national living wage, but less than £100,000 per year. This applies for self-employed and zero hour contracts.
- both parents are employed but one or both of them are temporarily away from the workplace on parental, maternity, paternity or adoption leave.
- both parents are employed but one or both of them are temporarily away from the workplace on statutory sick
- one parent is employed and one parent has substantial caring responsibilities based on specific benefits received for caring.
- one parent is employed and one parent is disabled or incapacitated based on specific benefits.
- Children who have a special guardianship order or are in foster care may also be eligible for 30 hours.

30 hours free childcare can be claimed by eligible families alongside tax credits, universal credit, tax-free childcare and other schemes to help pay for any additional childcare.



THE CURRICULUM

Playing and Learning

Playing and Learning
Playing and learning inside and outdoors is at the core of everything we do in Early Years. Prior to the children starting with us we have a comprehensive transition programme including setting visits to any previous nursery provision they may have attended and home visits to ensure that we are fully prepared to support and extend each child's next steps in learning. Information collected during transition and from observations when the child starts nursery or reception class then informs each child's baseline assessment, which allows us to plan next steps.

We offer the children a broad, ambitious curriculum that enables children to become confident and enthusiastic learners. This curriculum builds on what children know and can do to ensure they have the skills and knowledge for their future learning.

The curriculum is split into prime and specific areas with the youngest children focusing on the prime areas of learning first.

- Show more confidence in new social situations
- Play with other children expanding their ideas
- Help find solutions to conflicts and rivalries

Children in Reception will be learning to:

- Negotiate space and obstacles safely, with consideration for themselves and others; Demonstrate strength, balance and coordination
- when playing;
- Move energetically, such as running, jumping, dancing, hopping, skipping and climbing
- Hold a pencil effectively in preparation for fluent writing using the tripod grip in almost all cases
- Use a range of small tools, including scissors, paint brushes and cutlery;
- Begin to show accuracy and care when drawing.

Mathematics

- 3-4 year olds in Nursery will be learning to: Recognise quantities of up to 3 objects without
- counting Link numerals and amounts up to 5
- Recite numbers past 5
- Record using own symbols, marks and numerals Compare quantities using 'more than' and 'fewer
- Talk about and explore 2D and 3D shapes using shape names, sides, corners, straight, flat and
- Understand and use positional language using words like 'in front of, behind, next to
- Make comparisons between objects relating to size, length, weight and capacity
- Talk about and identify patterns Children in Reception will be learning to:
- Have a deep understanding of number to 10, including the composition of each number
- Subitise (recognise quantities without counting) up
- Automatically recall (without reference to rhymes, counting or other aids) number bonds up to 5 (including subtraction facts) and some number bonds to 10, including double facts
- Verbally count beyond 20, recognising the pattern of the counting system
- Compare quantities up to 10 in different contexts, recognising when one quantity is greater than, less than or the same as the other quantity;
- Explore and represent patterns within numbers up to 10, including evens and odds, double facts and how quantities can be distributed equally

Reading and Writing

3-4 year olds in Nursery will be learning to:

- Understand the key concepts about print i.e. that print has meaning and has different purposes, that we read from left to right and top to bottom, the names of different parts of a book and page sequencing
- Develop their phonological awareness
- Engage in extended conversations about stories, learning new
- Write some or all of their name
- Write some letters accurately in their early writing <u>Children in Reception will be learning to</u>:
- Say a sound for each letter in the alphabet and at least 10 digraphs;
- Read words consistent with their phonic knowledge by soundblending;
- Read aloud simple sentences and books that are consistent
- with their phonic knowledge, including some common excep-
- Demonstrate understanding of what has been read to them by retelling stories and narratives using their own words and re-
- cently introduced vocabulary Anticipate, where appropriate key events in stories
- Use and understand recently introduced vocabulary during discussions about stories, non-fiction, rhymes and poems and
- during role-play Write recognisable letters, most of which are correctly formed
- Spell words by identifying sounds in them and representing the sounds with a letter or letters
- Write simple phrases and sentences that can be read by oth-

Understanding the World

3-4 year olds in Nursery will be learning to:

- Begin to make sense of their own life-story and family's history
- Show an interest in different occupations
- Explore how things work
- Understand the key features of the life-cycle of a plant and animal
- Talk about the differences between different materials and the changes they notice
- Continue to develop positive attitudes about the differences between people
- Know that there are different countries in the world and talk about the differences they have experienced or seen in
- Children in Reception will be learning to:
- Describe their immediate environment using knowledge from observation, discussion, stories, non-fiction texts and
- Know some similarities and differences between different religious and cultural communities in this country, drawing on their experiences and what has been read in class
- Explain some similarities and differences between life in this country and life in other countries, drawing on
- knowledge from stories, non-fiction texts and when appropriate maps Explore the natural world around them, making observations and drawing
- pictures of animals and plants
- Know some similarities and differences between the natural world around them and contrasting environments, drawing on their experiences and what has been read in class
- Understand some important processes and changes in the natural world around them, including the seasons and changing states of matter
- Talk about the lives of the people around them and their roles in society; Know some similarities and differences between things in the past and now, drawing on their experiences and what

- Begin to develop complex and imaginative stories with small world

Sharing the learning with our families.

We welcome parents/carers in to Nursery and Reception at the beginning of each session and offer other opportunities for you to come into school to share in our learning activi-

We use the school newsletter and half termly class newsletters to share with you what the children have been learning in class.

Parents/Carers are also invited to attend Parents' Meetings/Evenings, assemblies, 'Stay and Play' curriculum sessions and other fun events that are arranged throughout the year.

At Forest Gate Academy we use the online learning journal Tapestry.

Tapestry is a way of promoting positive home-school relationships and celebrating children's learning and development.

The Tapestry platform provides a quick way to record written, photographic and video observations of children's learning.

These observations can easily be shared with parents enabling them to view significant achievements and activities that their children achieve at school and it allows parents and carers to share things of interest that their children do outside of school.

Once your child starts school you will receive an email with an activation link. You will then be able to create a password and pin and begin to see observations of your child learning at school and post your own comments and observations.





PHONICS

The children take part in a variety of speaking and listening activities to help them develop their phonics skills.

During their time in Nursery, children develop these skills through the following 7 aspects:


- Environmental sounds
- Instrumental sounds
- Body percussion
- Rhythm & rhyme
- Alliteration
- Voice sounds
- Oral blending and segmenting



In Reception class the children are introduced to the 'Read, Write Inc' phonic programme. The children take part in daily phonic sessions and are taught the sounds in English, the letters that represent them and how to form the letters when writing. Phonic reading books are sent home each day so the children can practice and apply the skills they have been taught at home. This systematic programme is also used in Year 1 and Year 2 and gets children off to a flying start with their reading and writing skills.









Behaviour Expectations

It is a primary aim of our school that every member of the school community feels valued and respected, and that each person is treated fairly and well. 






Rewards System

Our behaviour system is called 'Rainbow Rewards' and focuses on more visual positive rewards for pupils, whilst including clear consequences for children struggling with behaviour choices. Pictured below, is a copy of what will be displayed in each classroom, dependent upon their Key Stage or Phase.







How can you help your child at home?

Reading

- Reading with your child is vital. Research shows that it's
 the single most important thing you can do to help your
 child's education. In Nursery we send a library book
 home each week to share together. In Reception Class
 we also send home a phonic reading book. It is school
 policy that you listen to your child read their phonic
 reading book at least 3x week and return it to school
 each day along with their signed reading diary.
- Think of ways to make reading fun you want your child to learn how pleasurable books can be. If you're both enjoying talking about the content of a particular page, linger over it for as long as you like.
- Schedule a regular time for reading perhaps when you get home from school or just before bed.
- Look for books on topics that you know your child is interested in – maybe dragons, insects, cookery or a certain sport.
- Make sure that your children's books are easily accessible in different rooms around your house.

Mathematics

- Try to make maths as much fun as possible games, puzzles and jigsaws are a great way to start.
- It is also important to show how we use maths skills in our everyday lives and to involve your child in this.
- Point out the different 2d and 3d shapes to be found around your home. Ask your children to name and describe these shapes
- Take your child shopping and talk about the quantities of anything you buy.
 Let your child handle money and work out how much things
- cost.Read number story and non-fiction books with your child.
